PALM SUNDAY - MARCH 24th



Palm Sunday commemorates the entrance of Christ into Jerusalem, when palm branches were placed in his path, before his arrest on Holy Thursday and his crucifixion on Good Friday. It thus marks the beginning of Holy Week, the final week of Lent.

CHRISM MASS - MARCH 25th

The bishop, joined by the priests of the diocese, gather at the Cathedral to celebrate the Chrism Mass. This Mass manifests the unity of the priests with their bishop.

Here the bishop blesses three oils — the oil of catechumens (oleum catechumenorum or oleum sanctorum), the oil of the infirm (oleum infirmorum) and holy chrism (sacrum chrisma) — which will be used in the administration of the sacraments throughout the diocese for the year.



HOLY THURSDAY - MARCH 28th

Holy Thursday is the commemoration of the Last Supper of Jesus Christ, when he established the sacrament of Holy Communion prior to his arrest and crucifixion. It also commemorates His institution of the priesthood.



GOOD FRIDAY - MARCH 29th

On Good Friday, the entire Church fixes her gaze on the Cross at Calvary. Each member of the Church tries to understand at what cost Christ has won our redemption. In the solemn ceremonies of Good Friday. in the Adoration of the Cross.



in the chanting of the 'Reproaches', in the reading of the Passion, and in receiving the preconsecrated Host, we unite ourselves to our Savior, and we contemplate our own death to sin in the Death of our Lord.

EASTER VIGIL - MARCH 30th

The Easter Vigil takes place after sundown on the night before Easter and is generally seen as the most important Mass of the year. This Mass celebrates the resurrection of Jesus Christ, and it is also a time when new members are baptized and received into the Church. The Easter Vigil is broken into four parts: the Service of Light begins the celebration, followed by the Liturgy of the Word, then the baptismal ceremony, and lastly the Eucharist.

The Divine Mercy devotion is a modern devotion to the attribute of God's infinite mercy that was promulgated by St. Faustina Kowalska in Poland, and later to the the Universal Church by Pope St. John Paul 11.

This devotion is multifaceted and has many different components: it involves a divinely inspired painting of Jesus with attached promises for its veneration, vocal prayers (the Divine Mercy chaplet and Divine Mercy Novena), a book (The Diary of Faustina Kowalska), a Holy Hour (3 o'clock), and a solemn feast day with attached indulgences (Divine Mercy Sunday).

Shortly before the outbreak of World War II, a simple, young, uneducated Polish nun received a special calling. On the night of Sunday, February 22, 1931, while she was in her cell, Jesus appeared to Sister Faustina as the "King of Divine Mercy." He was wearing a white garment with red and pale rays emanating from his Sacred Heart. He would continue to appear and speak to her, and for four years St. Faustina recorded Jesus' words, her visions, and her own thoughts and prayers in a personal diary.

Jesus also taught St. Faustina prayers to implore his Divine Mercy. Using regular rosary beads, you begin the chaplet with an 'Our Father', 'Hail Mary', and 'I believe' (the Apostle's Creed). Then on the large (Our Father) beads say the following words:

'Eternal Father, I offer You the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of Your dearly beloved Son, Our Lord Jesus Christ. in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world." On the smaller (Hail Mary) beads pray:

'For the sake of His sorrowful Passion have mercy on us and on the whole world.' In conclusion pray these words three times: 'Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world'.

Jesus asked that the Feast of the Divine Mercy be preceded by a Novena to the Divine Mercy which would begin on Good Friday. For a list of the Souls to pray for each of the 9 days, go to:

CELEBRATING THE EASTER SEASON WITH CHILDREN

All the Easter crafts, snacks, games, books, etc. couldn't possibly all happen on actual Easter Sunday- it's too much! But that's ok because the Church, in her infinite wisdom, granted an entire season of Easter that lasts for 50 days, all the way through Pentecost! Here are some ideas to celebrate the 50 days with your children:

- 1. Display a resurrection set! Just like you have a nativity set during Christmas, have a resurrection set and display it somewhere prominent during the Easter season. Don't have one? Make one!
- 2. Make your own Pascal candle, or get a white candle blessed by your priest. Light it each night at dinner through the Easter season.
- 3. Decorate your house for Easter. It's not too late- it's exactly the right time!
- 4. Teach your kids to say "He is Risen" and then the person responds "He is risen, indeed!" and proclaim this as a greeting to them through the Easter season.
- 5. Display the word "Alleluia" prominently in your home during this season. Be sure to point out to your kids that word "Alleluia" has been missing from the mass during Lent, and now it is back.
- 6. Make cross crafts. There are unlimited colorful and fun ideas for this!
- 7.Learn about the Stations of Light (or "Stations of the Resurrection") to see what all happened between Jesus rising from the dead and Pentecost. There's a lot of stuff! This is the Easter equivalent of the Lenten Stations of the Cross.
- 8. Pray a Divine Mercy chaplet as a family. It's easy to learn and goes much faster than a rosary.
- 9. Read your favorite Easter picture books with your children. If you don't have any, start a small collection. 10. Pray the joyful mysteries of the rosary together as a family. Easter is certainly the perfect time for that.

EASTER MESSAGE FROM BISHOP MIEHM

"Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here but has risen" (Lk 24:5).

Dear Sisters and Brothers in the Diocese of Peterborough,

The Church embraces the celebrations of this Holy Week, commemorating the passion and death and resurrection of the Lord. Thereafter we advance quickly to the wonderful season of Easter, a time of renewal and hope and a time to see with the eyes of faith the great wonders that God has done and continues to do.

It is said that one of the best ways to get the attention of your audience is to ask a probing question at the start of a talk. So, give full marks to the angels at the Lord's tomb that Easter morning, who asked one of the most probing questions in all of history: "why do you look for the living among the dead?" Part challenge, part correction and part invitation to see things in a new way, it must have taken the faithful women by surprise. But apparently it was a rhetorical question, since the angels did not wait for an answer, but went on to explain, "He is not here, but has risen."Once they had the attention of their audience, they wasted no time in sharing the good news - good news that the women would also quickly share, as they went to tell the apostles.

Pope Francis has said that the question addressed to the women that Easter morning is posed to each one of us. "Why do you look for the living among the dead?" It's one that should grab our attention and invite us to a new way of seeing things. Do we cling to what is sterile, bleak, and hopeless, just because it is familiar?Do we give in to cynicism and defeatism, supposing that things in the world, the Church, our neighbourhoods, and families can never improve? Easter is a call to reject the malaise that can afflicts so much of modern life and to embrace a new way of living with a spirit of hope. As the Holy Father has said, "Death, solitude and fear are not the last word. There is a word that transcends them, a word that only God can speak; it is the word of the resurrection."

The angels' question should snap us to attention this Easter, reminding us that because of the Lord's resurrection, we can always lay claim to hope. May God bless you and yours richly in this season of great joy.
